

Distance Education: An Alternative to Traditional College

The method of earning an accredited college degree by self-study through the mail or over the Internet, commonly called *distance education*, is becoming more popular as an alternative to traditional college. This unconventional approach to learning has many benefits, including:

- Greater control over course content
- Flexible scheduling, allowing more involvement in family, church, and community
- Avoiding immersion in a morally toxic campus
- Less financial burden, increasing the opportunity to save for the future
- Study methods patterned after “real world” work
- Course credit can often be earned through portfolio review and CLEP
- Actual work experience can be gained while studying
- Optional apprenticeship possible, leading to richer employment opportunities later on

Until recently, distance education was targeted mainly at adults who wanted to continue their education. Now many high school graduates are discovering that it is an excellent way to earn a degree as well. I was one of those high schoolers, starting a distance education program in 2001 and graduating last year with a four-year degree in computer science. By graduation, I had no student debt whatsoever and had gained over three years of job experience in my field while maintaining a strong relationship with my family.

I believe that home schoolers should seriously consider distance education for their high school students who desire to earn a college degree. My goal in this talk today is to equip you to make an informed decision about which distance education option is best for your student, and to take the next steps in choosing a college, adapting to the distance education paradigm, and so on.

Where to Find Distance Education Programs

Most state universities and local community colleges now offer distance education courses. These are often referred to as “continuing education courses.” For example, colleges like N.C. State and Liberty University both offer courses which can be taken by mail or online. Even if a college does not offer a complete distance education degree program, you can take individual courses from that college and apply them towards a complete degree program at another college. In addition, there are many fully accredited colleges that offer degrees entirely by distance education such as:
